## Weekly Letter

# "Pope Francis"

I was struck by how immediately after the announcement of the death of Pope Francis the media were speculating about a successor, listing the contenders and what they stood for, and asking whether the next Pope should be "conservative" or "liberal" and where should he come from and so on. What struck me was how something – the death of a revered and much-loved man - should be treated like television drama. But then I suspect for most Catholics, like myself, the Pope is not simply "the leader of the Roman Catholic Church" – some sort of super CEO, but "the Holy Father" – and it is that paternal relationship to each of us which really matters.

I certainly had no idea who was going to be elected after Pope Benedict retired, and I am not sure I'd ever heard of Cardinal Bergoglio who became Pope Francis, so I am not speculating on the conclave. I would like to think that I can put my trust and my hope in the workings of the Holy Spirit, and in the judgement and faith of those cardinals who are entrusted to discern who among them is the right person to shepherd the Church in these turbulent times.

I shall be praying for the process, and I will continue to pray for Pope Francis, and no doubt, learn more about him and his vision of the Church as more is revealed in these days following his death.

It is quite clear from the gospels that the Lord entrusted Peter with the task of shepherd of His flock, even though he was aware of Peter's weakness. My task in this is to keep myself faithful in prayer and for all of us to encourage one another and await the white smoke from the Sistine chapel, that will tell us that, once again, we have a Pope.

May your celebration this Easter, as we pray for the Church at this time, be a great consolation and a real inspiration to your faith.

#### Sunday Readings – a brief reflection

Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> April 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of Easter

Acts 5:12-16; Ps 117; Rev 1:9-13, 17-19; Jn 20:19-31.

The picture that Luke gives us of the first followers of the Risen Lord in the first reading is an idealised one – he wants his readers to know what sorts of signs reveal an authentic Christian community. And an essential part of that is the effect it has on others – and a lot of the language used by Luke in dealing with such things as healings deliberately echoes the language used to describe Jesus' own ministry. The community has a clear continuity with the Lord. That is an integral part of Luke's theology of the Church as expressed in the book of Acts.

There is a wonderful contrast with the second reading from the book of Revelation. The Liturgy of the Word at Mass throughout the various cycles is restrained with passages from Revelation — that is because it can seem quite alien to the modern world, and yet the last book of the Scriptures has an important role in reminding us all that we cannot domesticate God's Word. We may allow ourselves to become over-comfortable with some passages from the gospels or selected passages from the Psalms and Prophets to comfort us, but the extraordinary words of John of

Patmos will always challenge us and call us to think long and hard about the God who is revealed in Jesus Christ. We can sometimes read the resurrection as a "happy ending" to a difficult story, which makes everything right, and allows us to carry on as normal. Reading Revelation invites us to acknowledge that with the Resurrection everything has changed, and the way has been opened to the infinite and unimaginable – and that is where we are destined. Faced with the inconceivable, like Thomas, we are invited to simply believe by the gift of faith.

For reflection:

Do you find the ideal picture which Luke paints in Acts of the early Church encouraging, or is it "impossible"?

Do you give any time to reading the Book of Revelation? Why is that?
